Call to Order: Trustee Guessferd called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and led the pledge of

allegiance.

Reports:

Motion by Trustee Bohrer to accept the Public and Non-Public Minutes of June 12, 2024. Seconded by Trustee Henderson. All in favor. Motion passed.

Correspondence: Director Pilla received several emails and thank you notes expressing how great National Night Out was and how much fun it was.

Treasurer's Report: Trustee Bohrer presented the June and July Treasurer's Report stating there was nothing unusual. Expenditures were a little high during the month of July due to the payment to GMILCS for the year.

CD Update: Four months ago the CD was rolled over and is due to mature on September 20, 2024. Trustee Bohrer spoke with TD Bank and they recommend being conservative and doing 2 short term CDs which have good rates. The current rate for short term CDs is 4.75%. She will update the Board next month. Trustee Bohrer will be attending the Trustees of the Trust Fund meeting tomorrow.

I attended the Quinceañera and National Night Out and even a virtual program that the Humanities Council put together. It was only offered by a few GMILCS libraries and we were one of them. It was terrific and I learned a lot. Everyone who is watching or listening to this I hope you were at the library this summer, but the library, of course, is there in all seasons so when school starts, kids can come to the library and get help with homework and assignments. There are always things to watch, learn and listen to at Rodgers Library.

Trustee Weber: Building on Margaret's and Karen's comments, I definitely have to applaud the staff for all they have done to achieve the numbers you have shown us, especially the Children's Room. I am floored at how many families enjoy the library. The Teens are a really hard group to pull in and it is the transportation which is unfortunate. CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING

The children's room has been steadily busy since school finished. We have fewer programs this year, but that didn't lighten the crowds. The children's staff has been constantly busy signing patrons up for the summer challenge, handing out prizes, answering reference questions, planning and preparing for programs, and running events. This is the smallest staff we've had in the four summers Tanya has been running summer programming. Even though we planned fewer programs, we are still stretched. It can be difficult to keep materials and toys organized and put away, while taking care of patron needs.

Maggie has been a welcome addition to the children's team! She is already adept at circulation tasks. Unfortunately, there is little time to teach the ins and outs of library programming in the middle of summer reading. This fall we will work on sharing those skills.

The <u>Summer Challenge</u> encourages patrons to try activities like reading outside their comfort zone, learn about the library, and get to know the Hudson community. Patrons sign up to receive a card. They earn a prize for each set of 5 activities they complete and a raffle ticket for the first set of five. Patrons who complete more than 20 items and turn in their card by 8/10 will receive a \$5 gift card to a business in Hudson.

It's been tough building relationships with teens. Over the last 15 months we have had three teen services staff members leave us. Trust is the most important part of teen services, so the transient staff have made it difficult to connect with teens and tweens.

When we hired a new youth services programmer, we decided we would share the responsibility of teen services among all three youth services programmers. This way teens will have the opportunity to get to know three staff members and hopefully it won't be as jarring if someone leaves.

Going into the fall, we are planning an after school Teen Hangout every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday. We are also planning one evening program for teens each month. For tweens we are planning at least two evening programs each month. The escape room was very popular, so we are hoping to do one a few times a year.


