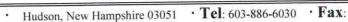

Hudson Library Board of Trustees Approved Public Meeting Minutes For October 16, 2024

Call to Order: Trustee Guessferd called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and Trustee St. Onge led the pledge of allegiance.

Treasurer's Report: Terri Cicia, bookkeeper, presented the Treasurer's Report in Trustee Bohrer's absence. All accounts are in order and there were no unexpected expenses incurred last month.

Old Business:

Hills Building Boiler:

Bob Gagnon has received several quotes for the replacement of the Hills Building boiler. There is currently no efficient electricity for a new boiler. The approximate cost to replace the boiler alone is \$71,000. The approximate cost to install a mini split is just under \$10,000. The boiler is currently working and has passed inspection. The next inspection is due in 2025.

Water Mitigation at Hills Building:

Both Director Pilla and Bob Gagnon will be meeting with Brian Emmerson from Emmerson Builders, LLC at the Hills Building to determine how to proceed with the repairs such as replacing the ramp, drywall, etc. Director Pilla will report findings to Trustees.

Strategic Plan

New Business:

Staff Appreciation Dinner:

The staff appreciation dinner has been scheduled for November 18 beginning at 5:00 p.m. Celebrations Catering has been retained to provide the food, etc. All staff and Trustees are invited to attend.

Motion by Trustee Henderson to spend no more than \$2,000 from account ending 0350 to cover all expenses for staff appreciation dinner. Seconded by Trustee Weber. All in favor. Motion passed.

Staff Recognition:

The Trustees are developing a plan to best recognize staff members who receive special achievements such as Para Librarian Certificates, degrees, etc. Some suggestions were a bonus or gift and recognition from the Trustees of these accomplishments. HCTV could be invited to record and take pictures for publication.

Circulation Policy:

Trustees discussed the current Circulation Policy. Discussion was had about the legal age limit for signing a Library of Things Policy. The Circulation Policy should have an addendum to include the Library of Things Policy which may differ from the standard items that circulate in the library. Director Pilla will create a skeleton of a Library of Things policy and bring it to the Board for further discussion. Policy will be finalized in December or January.

Full Time Position Update:

Director Pilla received 5 applications for the full time position. Interviews are scheduled for Friday, October 18, 2024. Director will report findings to Trustees.

Old Sealed Minutes:

Trustees will put a process in place for reviewing old sealed minutes to determine if they are ready to be unsealed. To be discussed at next regular meeting.

Trustee Comments

Trustee Weber: Upon reading Linda's report, I was very impressed with our school outreach. You hit all the great stops to get out there. There was the School District Committee Fair, Second Language, you went to a PTO meeting, to an English Department meeting. All areas that I was thinking of. I'm very impressed.

Rodgers Memorial Library Director's Report

Activities for September 2024

Throughout September, our team has been quite busy with various tasks. Many staff members have been dedicated to obtaining their paralibrarian certificates, which has involved participating in qualifying workshops and events. We've also spent a significant amount of time on budget planning, as well as addressing the additional workload stemming from the flood at Hills ML. The library director and the facilities manager met with three different remediation companies to ensure that the scope of work for Hills ML would be properly addressed. Additionally, we have hired an independent inspector at the request of the Board of Trustees to gather further information about the extent of the damage.

Hudson Non-Profit Group - Unfortunately, this group has disbanded at this time due to a lack of participation. The return of a Hudson newspaper has generally satisfied the needs of most groups with its community calendar. RML has been a strong supporter of this group since its establishment and maintains a positive working relationship with many individual groups.

RML's Staff Training Day, held on Friday, September 13th, was a resounding success. The day began with our usual "state of the library" discussion, followed by an engaging and informative workshop led by PRIMEX staff. The workshop aimed to delve into the different ways we perceive our working environment and interact with each other. The facilitators were impressed by the high level of engagement and clear mutual support within the group. The long-term benefits of improved communication are yet to be fully realized, but the DISC Assessment used during the workshop may prove to be a valuable tool for future hiring, helping us find individuals who will thrive and enjoy working at the library.

Director Pilla worked with the BOT Treasurer to prepare the FY26 budget, and the Board of Trustees met in a special session on Monday, September 23 to finalize the budget. Pilla also met with the Hudson Finance Director to input all relevant information into MuniSmart. The next step will be to meet with the Board of Selectmen at the annual budget hearings later in October.

SCHOOL OUTREACH

We have already made more connections with the school than last year. We were invited to two events.

A family from Guatemala visited the library the next day to get library cards. Vicky called the family to let the teenage son know that we found him some Spanish-language books to read.

Christina Farris (PTO president) invited Tanya to the PTO Jamboree. Tanya set up a table to tell families about library resources. Everyone was invited to color a discarded DVD that Marissa combined with the DVDs from the ELC Community Fair and Friends of Benson Park Family Fun Day to create a beautiful art installation.

Tanya was also able to connect with the head of the English department at Alvirne High School. We are working on field trips for freshman English classes this fall.

Museums

Museums have slowed down, and no organization was in double digits for checkouts. The top two were tied at seven: the NH State Parks and Zoo New England (surprisingly, not the NE Aquarium).

A while ago, a staff member suggested the library look at getting a membership to Wolf Hollow in Ipswich, MA. Mark inquired and was informed that they do not have a library program. A representative followed up in late September, stating that they are looking to pilot a library membership, and will provide a code that gives attendees 50% off the non-member price. In return, they ask for a donation of our choosing. Mark brought the idea to Linda who will look into it further.

At this point, Mark has been highlighting a different museum each week in the newsletter and will continue to do so for each in turn.

Social Media

Rodger That! Google Analytics shows 215 new users for an average engagement time of 18 seconds. No new content was added. We have 94 subscribers, the same as last month. There were 305 total views and 5.5 hours of watch time. No new content was added.

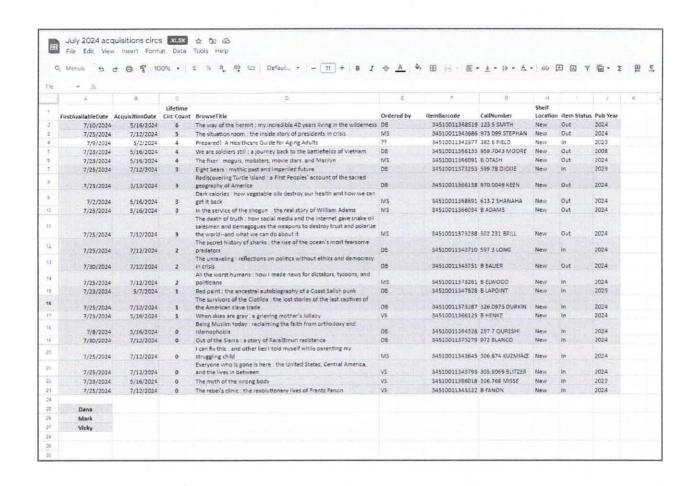
